Although this publication is dated August 2021, it should be noted that some data is taken from previous monthly/quarterly results, if they are the most recent. The ABS data relates to the most recent quarters/months of 2019-2021. In this version of the Snapshot, care must be taken when interpreting any comparison of data from different quarters or months. Unless otherwise stated, all apprenticeship and overall training data is current from TRS as of April 2021. All interpretations and conclusions drawn from this data are those of the Construction Training Fund.

#### Important updates



- A new pilot program, Construction Accelerated Apprenticeship Program (CAAP), is offering accelerated apprenticeship pathways for WA construction workers. The program offers free skills assessment to recognise existing or past construction industry workers who have prior skills and experience but no formal qualifications. The program is being run in partnership with metropolitan and regional TAFEs.
- An Asbestos Awareness interactive resource has been developed to complement the new core unit, Practice Asbestos Awareness in the Construction Industry, which forms part of the 52824WA Certificate II in Building and Construction - Pathway Trades and the 52700WA Certificate II in Plumbing.

The resource was funded by Reflections and developed by Reflections, Cell Media and the Construction Training Council. The free resource will be made available to Registered Training Organisations delivering the Certificate II Pathway and Plumbing courses.


- The Training Council has provided industry intelligence to assist the State Training Board in preparation of the State Priority Occupation List (SPOL) for 2021.
- The Job Ready Programs that were initiated towards the end of 2020 have been very successful with 115 students enrolling in the Bricklaying Job Ready Program as at the end of June 2021. Of those 115 students:
  - 78 had completed the skill set with 45 proceeding to work placement.
  - 11 Aboriginal students completed the program and 3 of those students offered an apprenticeship.
  - 8 female students have completed the program.
  - 25 jobseekers have completed the program resulting in 7 students gaining employment.
- The Civil Job Ready Program has been equally as successful with 215 students enrolling in the Civil Job Ready Program. Of these students:
  - 31 are currently progressing
  - 91 have completed their training
  - 50 are employed
  - 3 are in further training
  - 55 students were Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islanders
  - 124 enrolled at a TAFE College.
- The CTF Mature Age Apprenticeship Pilot Program has been successful with the direct indenture recruitment milestone of 50 apprentices achieved, including:
  - 2 Indigenous
  - 5 Female
- The Group Training Organisations recruitment target date has been revised to 31 August 2021. Progress to the 30 June 2021 includes:
  - 1 Indigenous
  - 9 Females
  - 49 apprentices in total



### Apprentice Commencements (Rolling 2 year period)



The chart illustrates when comparing the Construction and Electrical trades April 2019/2020 four quarters to April 2020/21 same four quarters, the numbers of apprentice commencements in both electrical and construction have significantly increased.

The increase in commencements can mostly be attributed to the Western Australian Governments \$5.5b Recovery Plan (2020), which assisted in the creation of more jobs and training opportunities and was supported by the wage subsidies implemented by the Federal Government.

The Construction Training Fund supports various qualifications outside of the Construction Training Package qualifications, for example, Mechanical, Fabrication and Industrial Trades qualifications. In this instance, comparisons show the 2019/2020 four quarters to April compared to the same four quarters to April 2020/21.






The number of construction, electrical and engineering apprentices in training has increased significantly, providing a pipeline of qualified workers for the future.

## The WA Construction Trades Workforce



## Traineeships in the Industry

The following chart shows the number of trainees in each qualification as of April 2021.



There are currently 926 trainees in training, primarily in the Civil Construction sector. This is compared to 543 trainees at the same time 12 months ago. The Civil Construction sector is expected to see sustained growth over the next few years as key projects, fundamental to the State Governments Recovery Plan, are rolled out. These projects will continue to require a skilled workforce.




